Our branches continued to be lively last year with a variety of activities:

Our Dance Branch, led by Karin Dron, held four Contra Dances. Contra Dancing has enjoyed a long tradition of offering dance for people of all ages with live music and all steps taught and called. January saw several readings of great political speeches with Catherine Dain reading a speech from Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the 19th century leader of women's suffrage movement. March, Zoe and Doc Murdock writers discussed the process of writing a novel and getting it published. April saw a tribute to Joan Raymund and Rivertalk.
